Empowerment Spotlight

FAMILY SEEKS REFUGE

Fleeing the conflict in Syria in 2013, Rosa, her husband, and three sons sought refuge in Jordan, where they endured a decade of waiting to enter the U.S. In January 2023, the couple, along with one of their sons, finally gained entry, while the two older sons, who had married and started families in Jordan, stayed behind.

In Jordan, the two elder sons provided financial support to the family. However, upon moving to the U.S. without them, the family lost that income and now faced unique challenges in a new community with a language barrier. In March 2023, feeling overwhelmed, they turned to UCFS-CALC for assistance.



UCFS-CALC stepped in to help the family by securing SNAP benefits, Medicaid, and food assistance through our Food Pantry program. Additionally, the Sharehouse Basic Needs Center provided essential items, including furniture, kitchenware, and cleaning supplies at no cost to the family. With these basic needs addressed, the family focused on saving for a vehicle, a significant step towards self-sufficiency.

Through ongoing case management, we are striving to find avenues to reunite Rosa with her two sons, who are still in Jordan. Both the family and UCFS-CALC remain optimistic as we work towards the goal of reunification.

JOURNEY TO CITIZENSHIP

Sam, a senior refugee from Iraq, was worried about how he would manage when his SSI benefits stopped after residing in the U.S. for more than seven years without obtaining citizenship. UCFS-CALC supported him in applying for U.S. Citizenship in 2019, but due to COVID delays, he was unprepared for his interview two years later and did not pass. Waiting patiently for two more years and utilizing the tools that he was given at UCFS-CALC, Sam seized his second chance in September of 2023.




Our staff helped Sam apply for CASH assistance to cover basic expenses. Our dedication to Sam's success did not stop there. Our team tirelessly


advocated for him, reaching out to USCIS through inquiries with the State Senator's office. The persistence paid off; thanks to the dedicated efforts and resources provided by UCFS-CALC, Sam now stands as a proud U.S. Citizen.

2023 Financials

We proudly present a transparent overview of UCFS-CALC's 2023 financial performance. Our community's generous support has enabled us to make a meaningful impact in our community and supported our mission to provide programs that guide, support, and empower individuals to achieve self-sufficiency with dignity and hope.







Pathway To Self-Sufficiency

UCFS-CALC's Sharehouse Basic Needs Center collects and distributes new and gently-used items to families and individuals in need. These items are provided at no cost to our clients and include furniture, mattresses, kitchenware, clothing, personal care items, and much more. Items are sourced through basic need drives, donated by supporters, or purchased with grant funding. In 2023, UCFS-CALC distributed 54,529 items from our Sharehouse, and 115 families were provided with furniture.

THE SHAREHOUSE



THRIVE PROGRAM

Provides social and emotional support to people with cognitive, developmental, and physical disabilities and their families. This program serves as a fun-filled haven for them to meet others who face similar circumstances and build a support system with one another.

The pantry is stocked with food from a variety of sources, including Gleaners Community Food Bank, Forgotten Harvest, donations from local retailers, and items from food drives hosted by individuals and community groups. Clients receive a healthy balance of fresh produce, dairy products, lean meats, whole grains, non-perishables, and cultural staples. In 2023, the food pantry distributed 382,510 of food to 856 households. That's almost 320,000 meals for families in need! In addition to fighting food insecurity, the food pantry is a gateway to other resources for clients and furthers integration through recipe cards, teaching our clients to incorporate new foods that are more affordable and easily accessible.




ELDERLY REFUGEE PROGRAM

collaborative effort between UCFS-CALC, and the Area Agency on Aging-1B (now AgeWays) to combat social isolation, increase integration, and promote overall health and wellness for refugees ages 60 years and older. UCFS-CALC hosts monthly recreational and educational activities and puts elderly refugees on the path to U.S. Citizenship. In 2023, we have been able to support over 260 seniors, giving them a greater sense of community.

Designed to navigate lawful permanent residents of the U.S. through integration, and ultimately, naturalization. To assist clients with obtaining citizenship, we offer free ESL (English as a Second Language) courses, citizenship instruction, mock interview practice and preparation, and legal assistance in applying for naturalization. These supportive services chart the road map to integration and give our clients a chance at the security that comes with being a U.S. Citizen.

ZENSHIP PROGRAM




PROJECT ACHIEVEMENT

A tutoring program for children from ALICE and low-income households. Each week, students receive help with homework, work with a specialist to improve their reading skills and participate in a hands-on STEAM activity. This program not only enriches their academic experiences but also improves social skills and confidence.

Reaching over 500 pregnant women and new mothers since 2016, this program provides the tools and knowledge they need to improve their health and the health of their families. Programming includes interactive educational workshops on topics such as pre-and post-partum health and nutrition, labor and delivery prep and planning, breastfeeding and lactation, sleep training, early childhood development and milestones, and even CPR and Lamaze classes. In 2023, we were able to empower 40 mothers to improve their families' health.

SUMMER YOUTH SPORTS

Participants are exposed to organized sports and free play, which improves leadership, social-and problem-solving skills, physical activity, and academic achievement. This program, partially funded by United Way of Southeast Michigan, seeks to support the development of the whole child and assist them in developing a healthy lifestyle early on.

Inspiring Volunteers

Throughout the year, we have achieved the unimaginable thanks to the dedication of our volunteers at UCFS-CALC. In our organization, volunteers transcend their role and become an integral part of our family. In 2023, our volunteers collectively contributed 4,739 hours to various initiatives. The Independent Sector has valued a volunteer hour at \$31.80 for 2023, meaning our volunteers have added an estimated value of \$150,700.20 to community. We are immensely grateful for the dedication and generosity of our volunteers, as their commitment goes beyond any measurable value.

Paving Pathways Parking Lot Transformation

The transformation of the UCFS-CALC parking lot has been a pivotal achievement in 2023, addressing long-standing issues that significantly impacted our community services. For years, the parking lot faced serious disrepair, resulting in frequent flooding during rainstorms. This created substantial challenges, particularly as the parking lot serves as a hub for various programs, including the drive-thru food pantry, Sharehouse Basic Needs Center, and client events like Trunk-or-Treat.

This project was a major undertaking, but the collective support of generous funders and donors made this much-needed transformation possible. The repairs were financed by The Carls Foundation's contribution of \$45k, along with Forgotten Harvest's \$20k capacity building grant, and the generosity of our donors at our 2022 Timeless Hope Gala, where over \$20k was raised specifically for this project. Encore Development providing at-cost services exemplified the community's commitment to our mission.

This collaborative effort has restored the parking lot and has revitalized the functionality and purpose of this space. The upgraded UCFS-CALC parking lot now serves as a safe and efficient location for our drive-thru food pantry. Clients are no longer burdened by concerns about the condition of their vehicles or the weather and can now access the Sharehouse without hindrance. With the support of our donors, funders, and partners, we have fortified the foundation upon which our essential services stand.


Thriving Together in 2023 and Beyond
